Facts and Figures

- Pennsylvania has the 16th largest population of noninstitutionalized people with disabilities in the country.
- 1.7 million Pennsylvanians live with physical disabilities needing assistance with self-care, mobility, and independent living in their communities.
- Pennsylvania currently spends over \$4.7 billion each year on Medicaid long-term care services and an additional \$381 million on preventive services for individuals not yet eligible for Medicaid long-term care.

Overview: Commission Responsibilities

- Identify and examine the critical issues and trends in Pennsylvania's longterm care services and supports delivery system
- Study existing long-term care resources available for individuals with physical disabilities, older adults, their families and caregivers
- Consult with various commonwealth departments and agencies on:
 - Regulations
 - Licensure
 - Financing
 - other responsibilities relating to long-term care.
- Review current and proposed state and federal legislation and regulations relating to long-term care.
- Make written recommendations to the Governor on findings



- The Commission shall submit a report to the Governor no later than December 31, 2014.
- The Executive Order expires: December 31, 2014

Work Group 1

Prevention

- To increase awareness of services and supports among the public
- Make recommendations to assist unpaid caregivers
- Promote activities that would maintain and improve health
- Provide technical assistance and consultation to agencies about available evidence-based, programs and services





Accessibility

- To examine the process to access services and the capacity of the healthcare system to meet the growing number and needs within long-term care
- Improve access to privately and publically funded long-term services and supports
- Make recommendations to improve intake processes for long-term care services



Work Group 3

Provision of Service

- To improve coordination of social medical and long-term care services within the continuum
- To examine best practices in care coordination
- To develop a person-centered system for the delivery of services



Work Group 4

Quality Outcomes and Measurement

- To improve the quality of services provided
- To improve the quality of information, data and service/health systems that serve people
- To provide cost-effective approaches
- To improve health outcomes of recipients
